CamillaOlsson

Camilla was born and raised in Hälsingland, but now lives in the university town of Uppsala, Uppland. She has been dancing since childhood, and as an 8 year old she had a dream of winning Halsingehambon. In 2004, she and her dance partner Magnus stepped to the top of the winner's podium. Camilla is never satisfied with her dancing as she knows that "everything can be better," and she feels that having fun is important. Camilla wants to share her feelings about dance and the many tips she has learned since childhood.

Magnus Mårtensson

Magnus moved from Hälsingland to Uppsala, Uppland with his family at the age of three. Most of his relatives still remain in Hälsingland, and he spends much of his spare time with them as well as at his summer house in Jarvso. Magnus has been folk dancing for over 20 years, and has participated in Hälsingehambon every year since 1992. He began dancing the competition with Camilla in 2003, and together they have won four years in a row. Magnus and Camilla have taught polskor and the intricacies of hambo for over 9 years. In 2010, they were part of the dance staff at Norlandia Camp. We are pleased to host their first appearance in North America.

Bengt Jonsson

Bengt has been playing since he was very young. Bengt's group, Jonssonlinjen, plays for Polskecirkusen, a dance group he organized in his home region of Hälsingland; he has also played for the Hälsinge Hambo Contest and the medal testing. Bengt is also leading Bollnäsbygdens Spelmanslag..In 2000 Bengt was awarded Riksspelman on the cowhorn.

Lena Jonsson

Lena Jonsson is a live-wire young Swedish fiddler from Hälsingland who delighted and charmed us at Julian in 2008. She has studied traditional music at the Royal College of Music in Stockholm. She was awarded Riksspelman on tunes from southern Hälsingland, third place in the Nordic Championship in Folkmusic, and nominated Newcomer of the Year at the Folk & World Music awards in 2010. She has toured in Europe the last years with different bands and solo.

Staffan Jonsson

Staffan plays the fiddle and the guitar. He studied folk music at the Ingesunds Music Academy with Mats Berglund and then spent some time learning the hardanger fiddle in Hallingdal. He currently lives in his hometown of Bollnäs and works as a teacher in the folk music projects Hälsinge Låtverkstad, and GUF. In 2006, Staffan was awarded the title "Riksspelman".

She has made over 20 study trips to Norway and has placed highly in many fiddle competitions there. Her recording with Andrea Hoag and Charlie Pilzer, "Hambo in the Snow," was nominated for a GRAMMY award in the Best Traditional World Music Album category.

Kerstin Palm

Kerstin has long experience in singing and kulning (Swedish herding calls). She will invite you to participate in vocal activities in a safe and relaxed environment. Come and try to find your inner strength, let your voice be heard and have fun! She is also an excellent fiddler.

Cedar Glen Camp

Camp is Thursday evening through Sunday afternoon. Cedar Glen Camp is located near the small town Julian. It was a gold mining area in the 19th century but is now mostly agricultural, predominantly apple orchards. Driving time is approximately 1½ hours inland from Oceanside, and 1 hour northeast from San Diego. The camp facilities include cabins that house varying numbers of people, and a large dining and dance hall with a very good wood floor. People should plan to arrive Thursday after 4 pm or early evening to get situated.

There is no meal service on Thursday. Workshops begin Friday morning after breakfast and conclude Sunday afternoon after lunch. Please try to make ride arrangements with people from your area. We will attempt to help coordinate transportation from airports but we cannot guarantee rides for any campers.

Mendocino Impressions June 2011

Last year, I overheard an offhand comment about a summer camp somewhere in the Northern California redwoods where great Swedish music could be found.

As a youngster, I attended Midsummers in Los Angeles with my grandparents from Västerbotten, and developed a rudimentary appreciation of Scandinavian folkways.

Ever curious about my ethnic heritage and also having a taste for traditional music, I had enrolled in a tour, which was to visit several Swedish summer folk festivals. Unfortunately, it had fallen through, so I thought perhaps this camp might be a reasonable substitute, and no doubt a good deal cheaper.

I tracked down Scandia Camp Mendocino on the internet, signed up, packed up, flew up and arrived at camp eager to learn Swedish tunes.

I'm a fiddle player, and have been to music camps large and small, old and new. I had some idea what I was getting into, but this camp exceeded expectations.

Fiddle camps usually have a bit of dancing, but generally, music is the central focus, and dancing is secondary, even incidental, to the music. And most (in some cases, all) of the campers are musicians.

At Scandia Camp Mendocino, dancing is the focus. Unlike the other music camps, full-on dances are featured every night. Music is by no means neglected. Indeed, the teachers and the music program are excellent, but most of the campers are dancers, not musicians. This is actually great for the musicians. Dancing is the heart of Scandia music. The dance and music are integral parts one of another.

So I devoted considerable energy to dancing. As the week went on, I danced more and more, attending the dance classes, and missing the music classes. The dance "fundamentals" sessions were terrific. I couldn't get enough, and I maxed out. By the end of the week, my legs were like rubber. I had danced my legs off! I could barely walk, much less dance, but it was all good. My dancing knowledge and skills had improved an order of magnitude, as did my appetite for dancing.

The general scene was easygoing, upbeat and conducive to learning. The camp is situated in an idyllic rustic setting. The food was remarkably interesting for camp food—sufficiently good to require iron discipline so as not to totally pig out.

Like all music camps, SCM is very much a sociable affair. The camp is a national, indeed international, forum for this very special subculture. The campers were by and large leaders of their respective regional Scandia communities from throughout North America and Scandinavia--more often than not, experts. A sophisticated and accomplished bunch, they, and all, had amusing anecdotes, cool tidbits of knowledge, and theoretical insights to share, and couldn't have been more congenial.

Other music camps I have attended have all been commercial enterprises. Generally, the organizers were musicians—some quite distinguished—who had set up teaching ventures not just to promote the art, but to bring in extra cash. It's no easy thing to make a living as a musician.

Scandia had a different atmosphere. The Scandia dance/ music/cultural community has created a non-profit cooperative to organize the camp. No doubt some of the organizers and teachers received a little money for their efforts, but generally there was much volunteerism, and a spirit of cooperation and shared passion for the art and culture infused the camp.

By week's end, I had not only wobbly legs, but also, a head full of tunes, new friends, new ideas, and most importantly, a powerful dose of cultural and musical inspiration, which should keep me energized until next summer.

First-time Mendocino Scandia Camper by Peggy Dougherty

It didn't take long to decide to go to camp in Mendocino. I had been taking classes in Scandinavian dance for a few weeks when the flyers for various fall and winter weekend workshops started appearing on the sign-in table of our classroom in Anaheim. With only Snoa and Schottis under my belt (feet?), I didn't think it was time to go out in the big wide dance world yet. But by March, and familiarity with the 40-plus dances we had done in class, camp seemed like a reasonable prospect. Plus, there would be a fundamentals class, suitable for beginners! The music classes appealed to my hammer dulcimer-playing husband, so off went the paperwork.

Some helpful emails from staff and mentors came a short time later. We made arrangements for the house and cat, and tried to guess how cold/warm/wet the weather would be. Soon we were heading up I-5 with instruments, recording devices and dance shoes.

The Mendocino Woodlands State Park is about 10 miles from the coastal town of Mendocino. This year, longtime campers say, the road is the worst they have seen. The recent rains kept the county road crews at bay, but only enhanced the gorgeous forest scenery along the way. Friendly faces greeted us upon arrival, and directed us to parking, cabins and registration.

We could tell that many of our fellow campers had been here before. I knew a few people from classes at home, and my husband and I had mentors who corresponded with us a few times and could answer questions. There were several of us "first-timers" who met for an orientation and introductions. Then came a convivial time known as Happy Half Hour. Then dinner, music and dancing—even more convivial.

As the week went on, the highlights continued to be music, dancing, and food. In the dance classes, the teaching level was just fine for my skill level. Classes were well-attended and it seemed that most everyone was getting what they needed. The musicians—staff as well as campers—were awesome. We came home inspired, and with CDs and notebooks full of tunes and dances to work on all year. The camp kitchen was outstanding. Such variety and so tasty! Some of us have dietary "issues" and allergies, and the cooks made accommodations cheerfully and promptly.

Now, a few weeks after camp ended, I appreciate even more the experience gained at Scandia Camp. The congenial atmosphere provided by both staff and other campers was the key, I believe. I hope to attend again.
